

#### Patrick's Seedlings!

As you can see from the smiling children's faces on the front page we are turning Kadzinuni green. One of the community volunteers, Patrick Nyambu who attended a special horticulture course in Nairobi a few months ago. has started the distribution of 6.000 Paw Paw tree seedlings. Every child at Kadzinuni Primary School is receiving 2 seedlings along with a short training session on how to plant out and care for the trees as they grow. The long rains have arrived, just a couple of weeks late, and this means the conditions for the seedlings to be distributed and planted out are ideal. The project is going so well that we are aiming to repeat the project but using a highly drought tolerant plant called Moringa.

appearance of the long, slender, triangular seed pods, Horseradish tree, from the taste of the roots which resembles horseradish, or Ben oil tree, from the oil derived from the seeds. The tree itself is rather slender, with drooping branches that grow approximately 10m in

It is also known as **Drumstick tree**, from the



height. In cultivation, it is often cut back annually to 1-2 metres and allowed to re-grow so the pods and leaves remain within arms reach. In developing countries, Moringa has potential to improve nutrition, boost food security, foster rural development and support sustainable land care. It serves as a vegetable which consists of a lot of nutrients and an immune booster for the people living with HIV/AIDS (PLWAs).

The cost of the project, to cultivate and distribute 1,500 Moringa seedlings is only just over £200! Would **YOU** like to support this?

Our thanks go to everyone who supported the event and in particular Tracey Lloyd from Transition Keyworth. The funds for the Jiggers & Bed Bugs project was sent to Kenya on 28th May so that Nurse in Charge Zipporah and American Peace Corps volunteer Kelly Sawyer can rid Kadzinuni of these awful little pests as soon as possible.

#### News from our sponsored students at Kilifi

Patrick took a day out from his seedlings project to visit Kilifi Township Secondary School to meet up with some of the students who are supported by sponsors here in the UK. He reminded them to work hard and also found that they may need to use some books from the new stock we recently bought for Trevor's Community Library.

#### Jiggers & Bed Bugs

We are delighted to have this detailed description of the plan for dealing with Jiggers & Bed Bugs at Kadzinuni. Kelly Sawyer, APC volunteer writes...

4th June 2012

Good afternoon.

I just wanted to update you on the project since the funds were released. We were able to pick up the funds without any problems.

Last week the organizing committee met to discuss the project and plan the next steps. In attendance were: Kelly, Zipporah, Ramtu (Public Health Officer), Mr. Nzai (District Public Health Officer).

#### Meeting notes:

Jigger/bed bug project will involve the training of 50 participants from throughout Kadzinuni Dispensary catchment area. The participants will be trained and serve as Community Health Workers (CHW's) in Kadzinuni. The CHW's will attend the 3 day training focused on jiggers and bed bugs and additional health issues relevant to Kadzinuni. Since the jigger and bed bug problem relates to other health topics, such as hygiene (jiggers thrive in unhygienic environments) and communicable diseases (sharing of pins to remove jiggers increases risk of HIV infection), it was decided to include additional health topics during the training.

The homes previously identified in Kadzinuni as being infested with jiggers or bed bugs will be sprayed and treated. Upon completion of the project the participants will educate those in their village while serving as CHW's. This allows the project to involve multiple community members and have increased impact as the participants continue to spread the knowledge they learned during the training and is sustainable.

The Public Health Officer will meet with the Sub-Chief and village elders to select the 50 participants. A meeting was chosen instead of a Baraza in order to be more effective in selecting those best suited to serve as CHW's on this project.

Focus of training will be on jiggers & bed bugs; additional topics to be included (as time allows) are: communicable diseases and hygiene. A detailed training agenda will be forthcoming.

#### The proposed timeline is as follows:

- 1) Participant/CHW selection completed by June 17
- 2) 3 day training class completed by June 22
- 3) Spraying of homes affected by jiggers/bed bugs completed by June 29

# **& our view of the future...**.....some serious stuff

Subject to our audit, which is already under way, in the financial year just completed we have increased the money raised for Kadzinuni from just over £15,000 to over £17,000. In these tough economic times that is a great result for us, as many small charities struggle. There is so much professional marketing by the huge national charities, who in the near future will also be able to tap into donors at the local cash machine, that small local organisations like ourselves have to fight for every penny, week in week out. Since we started back in 1998 we have secured well over £200,000 to spend on our key priorities of education, healthcare and community development at Kadzinuni. Elaine and I (so ably supported by the other Trustees) have always set out to use the funds we raise in such a way that the benefits for Kadzinuni are sustainable.

We aim for deep seated social change whereby the people at Kadzinuni become economically self sufficient and able to determine their own futures. Simply, we see that we will fail if The Friends of Kadzinuni acts as a crutch, causing collapse if withdrawn.

We now believe that we have passed the "tipping point" between long term success and failure as now so many of the projects we support are created and managed by local people in Kadzinuni, exercising the skills that 10 years ago were nonexistent. That does not mean that we can back off as now we strive to accelerate the pace of development.

**Education** in every sense of the word is fundamental to success; young people need to go to school so that they can learn the skills for a creative and fulfilling life; young families need to understand health issues, our work to improve healthcare at Kadzinuni will in time significantly reduce death in childbirth, itself one of the factors that reduces unsustainable birth rates.. yes.. save more babies lives and the birth rate falls so families become more able to support themselves as their futures can be more predictably planned.

In 2011, for the first time since the school was opened in 1923, Kadzinuni Primary School was top of the league tables for the coastal district, competing with over 30 other schools, many of which are in more wealthy towns. Our student sponsorship scheme creates competition for the bursaries we grant each year and now very few girls drop out of school; something that was all too common just 10 years ago. The school now attracts the best teachers and also has a thriving set of sports teams.

Such is the change that has taken place that a few weeks ago one of our community volunteers, Patrick Nyambu, now a specialist in horticulture, was featured in a TV programme made by the Kenya Broadcasting Corporation (KBC) to provide education on how to farm coconuts and show the many ways in which this crop can benefit poor communities. Kadzinuni is leading the way!



Healthcare is also at the heart of what we do. Until 5 years ago there was no heath care available in Kadzinuni, qualified nurses were several hours walk away.... absolutely useless if you are too sick to walk. Now Kendrick's Clinic is buzzing every day and by 2015 we hope to have extended it to provide 24 x 7 care, as a small hospital and maternity unit. It delivers primary treatment AND most importantly runs services for prevention and vaccination programmes for a wide range of diseases that previously killed many people prematurely.

Community Development is a challenging area to work in. We have no desire to try and change underlying cultural values that would be wrong. So, we aim to try and act as facilitators of projects and improvement. We always try to say yes to ideas coming from the community, and are pleased when we are asked for advice. With that approach you must expect "failure" sometimes, or perhaps not so much failure, more about finding a way to ensure that there is a positive outcome, even if it is not the outcome originally intended.

One thing is for sure on our journey with Kadzinuni, WE LEARN SOMETHING JUST ABOUT EVERY DAY and that is what makes it so fulfilling.
